### my story

With Black Cancer, I wanted to create something I wish I would've had during my own cancer journey. For over two years, I was a 'strong Black woman' whose mind and body felt weaker than it's ever been. I felt alone. In between doctor's appointments, medication adjustments and trying to understand myself as someone living with a chronic condition, I was just too broken, too hurt and too tired to find the community I desperately needed.

Not one single person of color should ever have to scour the internet looking for someone like them.
